Dr. Rahmany is a Clinical Psychologist and completed his master's degree and doctorate in Clinical Psychology at John F. Kennedy University and Rosebridge/Argosy University and has taught at John F. Kennedy University, Alliant International University and Chabot College. He has completed his doctoral dissertation on the psychological adjustment of the Afghan refugees in the United States. He is the author of "Where the Bear met the Lion" and has written extensively on refugees' struggle in their host country.

Dr. Rahmany has had a satellite TV show for the past ten years and has discussed major psychological disorders that are experienced by the Afghan population. Dr. Rahmany is the founder/President of the Afghan Psychological Association of America, a non-profit community-based organization, and is the co-founder of The Hume Center. He has held multiple administration positions (e.g., Director of Partial Hospitalization program, Assistant Director of Outpatient Services, etc.) and has been running a private practice in Newark, California for the past 15 years where he treats patients with diverse clinical challenges.
