



### Program Overview, Stipend Eligibility and Application Submission Procedures FY 2019 - 2020

#### **Program Overview:**

The Mental Health Services Act (MHSA), also known as Proposition 63, was passed by California voters in November 2004. Workforce Development, Education, and Training (WET) is an important MHSA component intended to fund strategies that address occupational shortages in the public mental health field through the development of academic pipelines, internships, and financial incentive programs. The Graduate Intern Stipend Program is a financial incentive strategy that is included in the ACBH WET Plan. This program is designed to recruit individuals into ACBH county-operated programs and contracted, community-based mental health or integrated health care organizations, thus creating a public mental health workforce pipeline.

Our workforce pipeline strategy is driven by the system needs of ACBH. With the implementation and current changes to the Affordable Care Act, workforce demands across our system continue to evolve. To build needed capacity in our integrated behavioral health system, the FY2019-20 ACBH Intern Stipend Program is seeking applications from student interns, in their second-year, who are pursuing a <u>Master's degree</u> in the following programs:

- Social Work (MSW)
- Counseling Psychology Marriage and Family Therapy Track
- Nurse Practitioners specializing in Psychiatric/Mental Health Nursing

<u>Additionally</u>, the FY2019-20 ACBH Intern Stipend Program is seeking applications from **Clinical Psychology** student interns who are pursuing <u>Doctorate degrees</u>.

#### **Stipend Objectives:**

#### Recruit graduate students who:

- Have linguistic capacity to provide services in one of the ACBH threshold languages which are: Spanish, Cantonese, Mandarin and Vietnamese.
- Reflect the diverse ethnic and cultural communities served by ACBH, and demonstrate knowledge and/or understanding of the cultural beliefs, practices, and language needs of the populations considered un-served, underserved, or inappropriately served. (See Glossary for listing of groups considered by ACBH to be un-served, underserved, or inappropriately served).
- Demonstrate experience and/or understanding of the needs of clients in one or more of the following critical program areas: Older Adult (60 plus), Transition Age Youth (16-24 years), Co-occurring Conditions (mental health and substance use disorders), Criminal Justice Mental Health, or Integrated Health Care Programs (which provide both physical and mental/behavioral healthcare services).





In FY 2019-20, based on the WET needs assessment, ACBH will provide **95%** of the stipends to graduate student interns who are enrolled in a qualifying school and pursuing a Master's degree in **Social Work, Clinical or Counseling Psychology - Marriage and Family Therapy Track, or Nurse Practitioners specializing in Psychiatric/Mental Health Nursing.** The remaining **5%** will be provided to students pursuing Doctorate degrees in **Clinical Psychology**. The Graduate Intern Stipend Program is available to students who will complete internships in the 2019-2020 academic year. Selected interns will receive two payments, in January, and in either June or July, for up to a maximum total of \$6,000 per year, in exchange for 720 internship hours worked. Students in part-time internship programs are eligible to apply. The awarded stipend will be prorated based on total internship hours completed. Interns completing fewer than 720 internship hours within the school year, will receive less than \$6,000.

The ACBH Graduate Intern Stipend Review Committee will access, score applications and provide recommendations for the final award decision to the ACBH Director for approval. Please keep in mind that writing, grammar, clarity and organizational skills will be assessed during the review process by the committee. Prior to disbursement of funds, satisfactory performance and verification of completed internship hours must be received and approved by the intern's direct supervisor. Receipt of the full amount of the stipend is contingent upon satisfactory performance during the entire placement and completion of the required number of internship hours.

The Graduate Intern Stipend Program application process is now available on the ACBH website: The deadline to submit an application is: Friday, October 11, 2019.

#### **Graduate Intern Stipend Program Eligibility Requirements:**

To be eligible for the stipend program, all applicants must be:

- Enrolled in a qualifying school and pursuing a Master's degree in Social Work, Counseling Psychology - Marriage and Family Therapy, or Psychiatric/Mental Health Nursing. Clinical Psychology students who are enrolled in a qualifying school and are pursuing a doctorate degree are also eligible to apply.
- 2. Enrolled in the second year of a Master's program. First-year Master's level students are **not** eligible, but are encouraged to apply in their second year. *Note: Intern stipend recipients must maintain "good academic standing" while enrolled in their college or university degree program.*
- 3. Currently serving as an intern in an eligible ACBH county-operated program or a contracted, community-based mental health, co-occurring conditions, or integrated care organization for a maximum of 720 internship hours for the 2019-2020 academic year.
- 4. Without a service obligation to another academic stipend program, such as CalSWEC.
- 5. A U.S. citizen or permanent resident and otherwise eligible for employment.





#### **Stipend Eligibility Considerations:**

- Preference will be given to Alameda County residents.
- ACBH eligibility selection criteria is based on specific workforce needs and gaps within the Systems
  of Care. Applicants are not required to meet all of the criteria listed below; however, consideration will
  be given to applicants who:
  - Demonstrate capacity to provide services to consumers in one of the ACBH threshold languages: Spanish, Cantonese, Mandarin, Tagalog and Vietnamese. Language proficiency must be verified by supervisor and/or;
  - 2. Demonstrate experience:
    - a. As mental health consumer or family member;
    - b. Work with and/or understand the needs of the diverse ethnic and cultural communities served by ACBH, and demonstrate knowledge and/or understanding of the cultural beliefs, practices, and language needs of the populations considered un-served, underserved, or inappropriately served. (See Glossary for listing of groups considered by ACBH to be unserved, underserved, or inappropriately served).
    - c. Working with Transitional Age Youth (TAY) and Older Adult clients/consumers;
    - d. Working with and/or understanding the needs of clients/consumers with co-occurring conditions (mental health and substance use disorders);
    - e. Working with clients/consumers receiving care in integrated health care (behavioral health and primary care) programs and/or;
  - 3. Are multicultural and whose cultural and/or ethnic background or experience is similar to the clients/consumers served by ACBH such as African American, Asian American, Asian Pacific Islander (API), Hispanic, Native American, South and Southeast Asian, Emerging Immigrant Populations, and Lesbian, Gay, Bi-Sexual, Transgender, Intersex, Queer, Questioning, 2-Spirit (LGBTIQQ2-S).

- School and Degree Program Information
  - o Provide name of school and degree program.
  - Enrollment Date and Expected Degree Conferral Date. It is sufficient that the school's Internship/Field Placement Coordinator verify these dates with his/her signature. The Internship/Field Placement Coordinator's signature on the application form implies that the applicant is in good academic standing.
- ACBH County or Contracted Mental Health Organization Internship Site:
  - An applicant's internship/field placement training must be located within an ACBH countyoperated program or a contracted, community-based mental health or co-occurring conditions, or integrated care organization. Applicants can confirm this information with their internship site.

#### PART III: CULTURAL COMPETENCY AND LANGUAGE PROFICIENCY

 Alameda County has five (5) threshold languages which are determined by the State and based on population data: Spanish, Cantonese, Mandarin, Tagalog and Vietnamese. Applicants who





are proficient in one of these threshold languages must complete the Language Proficiency verification. Internship Site Supervisors must confirm the applicant's language proficiency.

 Please self-identify if applicant considers themselves part of an underserved, unserved or inappropriately served population/community or from an economically disadvantaged background and if so, how this has influenced applicants professional goals.

#### PART IV: APPLICANT ELIGIBILITY INFORMATION - ESSAYS

Please respond to three questions on separate pages in an essay format, and attach <u>typed</u> responses as part of the application. Each essay response should be brief (limited to 350 words per essay) yet informative enough to convey the strengths applicant brings to public mental health practice. **Responses should support the graduate intern stipend program objectives.** 

#### **Glossary**:

- A Consumer or person with Lived Experience is a person who has experienced mental health issues that have disrupted his or her education, employment, housing, social connections and/or quality of life. He or she has utilized mental health services and has a personal experience of stigma, discrimination or social exclusion.
- A Family Member is a person who now or was in the past, either the primary caregiver or a
  concerned and involved person who provides a significant level of support to a person who is
  living with a Severe Mental Illness (SMI), Serious Emotional Disturbance (SED) or other
  mental health issues.
- Underserved, Unserved and inappropriately served populations could include consumers of any age who have been diagnosed with a severe mental illness and/or serious emotional disturbance and are receiving some services, but are not provided the necessary or appropriate opportunities to support their recovery, wellness and/or resilience. These consumers include, but are not limited to those who are so poorly served that they are at risk of homelessness, institutionalization, incarceration, or other serious consequences; members of ethnic/racial, cultural, and linguistic populations that do not have access to mental health programs due to barriers such as poor engagement and outreach, limited language access and lack of culturally competent services. In Alameda County the following populations have been identified as unserved, underserved and/or inappropriately served: African-American, Asian Pacific Islander (API), Hispanic, Native American, South and Southeast Asian, Lesbian, Gay, Bi-Sexual, Transgender, Intersex Queer, Questioning, 2-Spirit (LGBTIQQ2-S), Transitional Age Youth (TAY) and Older Adults.
