Dr. Rahmany regularly educates the community



regarding psychological disorders commonly experienced by the Afghan population through his free satellite TV show. He is the author of "Where the Bear met the Lion" and has written extensively on refugees' struggle in their host country, cofounded the Hume Center, and is founder/President of the Afghan Psychological Association of America, a non-profit community-based organization.
