Course Objectives

- 1.) Discuss the impact of generational trauma and 2 culturally responsive tools for engaging individuals who experience this type of trauma.
- 2.) Identify 2-3 common challenges related to engaging diverse populations, especially those impacted by complex trauma and who have been historically marginalized, oppressed, and minoritized due to their cultural identity.
- 3.) Review 5 principles and strategies typically valued and applied from a culturally responsive lens for individuals and families.
- 4.) Review the definitions of Cultural Humility/Culturally Responsive and identify 2 components of its relevance to service delivery.

In the helping profession, we work with individuals, families, and communities with diverse backgrounds; therefore, we understand the value of maintaining a multicultural framework. In addition to the complexities of working with individuals, youth, and families from a multicultural perspective, we are also supporting folks as they manage generations of trauma. This course is designed to support providers with building on their current skills so that they can effectively engage and support diverse groups of people while maintaining a culturally responsive and trauma informed lens. It is important to build on our awareness and understanding of cultural humility, which involves being open to the other. As we strengthen our ability to be open to the other, we will be open to shaping and adapting our support and service delivery to be culturally responsive rather than taking a "one size fits all" approach to service delivery.
