EXHIBIT A SCOPE OF WORK

1. GRANT AGREEMENT - PROPOSITION 47 GRANT PROGRAM

This Grant Agreement is between the State of California, Board of State and Community Corrections, hereafter referred to as BSCC and Alameda County Health Care Services, hereafter referred to as Grantee or Contractor.

2. PROJECT SUMMARY AND ADMINISTRATION

- A. The purpose of the Alameda County Proposition 47 Project (ACProp47) is to support residents who are involved in the justice system who have a mental health issue and/or substance use disorder (SUD) that limits one or more of their life activities. To this end, ACProp47 project funds will be used to augment and expand services under the County's coordinated reentry plan. Specifically, funds will be used to: 1) implement a new, county-wide, intensive, multidisciplinary reentry team model to provide service for members in the target population who are experiencing moderate to severe mental health issues and/or substance use disorders; 2) augment contracts with existing community based SUD providers to increase numbers of people in the target community who receive their services; and 3) launch a new grant program designed to increase the number and ability of organizations in the County to provide comprehensive housing supports.
- B. Grantee agrees to administer the project in accordance with Attachment 1: Proposition 47 Request for Proposal (incorporated by reference) and Attachment 2: Grant Proposal/Application for Funding, which is attached and hereto and made part of this agreement.

3. PROJECT OFFICIALS

- A. The BSCC's Executive Director or designee shall be the BSCC's representative for administration of the Grant Agreement and shall have authority to make determinations relating to any controversies that may arise under or in connection with the interpretation, performance, or payment for work performed under this Grant Agreement.

C. Grantees shall submit all other reports and data as required by the BSCC.

6. PROJECT RECORDS

- A. The Grantee shall establish an official file for the project. The file shall contain adequate documentation of all actions taken with respect to the project, including copies of this Grant Agreement, approved program/budget modifications, financial records and required reports.
- B. The Grantee shall establish separate accounting records and maintain documents and other evidence sufficient to properly reflect the amount, receipt, and disposition of all project funds, including grant funds and any matching funds by the Grantee and the total cost of the project. Source documentation includes copies of all awards, applications, approved modifications, financial records and narrative reports.

- C. Personnel and payroll records shall include the time and attendance reports for all individuals reimbursed under the grant, whether they are employed full-time or part-time. Time and effort reports are required for consultants (subcontractors).
- D. The grantee shall maintain documentation of donated goods and/or services, including the basis for valuation.
- E. Grantee agrees to protect records adequately from fire or other damage. When records are stored away from the Grantee's principal office, a written index of the location of records stored must be on hand and ready access must be assured.
- F. All Grantee records relevant to the project must be preserved a minimum of three (3) years after closeout of the grant project and shall be subject at all reasonable times to inspection, examination, monitoring, copying, excerpting, transcribing, and auditing by the BSCC or designees. If any litigation, claim, negotiation, audit, or other action involving the records has been started before the expiration of the three-year period, the records must be retained until the completion of the action and resolution of all issues which arise from it or until the end of the regular three-year period, whichever is later.

7. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

- A. Existing law prohibits any non-governmental sub-grantee, partner or like party who participated on the Proposition 47 Executive Steering Committee (ESC) from receiving funds from the Proposition 47 grants awarded under this RFP. Applicants who are awarded grants under this RFP are responsible for reviewing the Prop 47 ESC membership roster (see Appendix A) and ensuring that no grant dollars are passed through to any non-governmental entity represented by the members of the Proposition 47 ESC.
- B. These conflict of interest rules do not apply to public employees that served on the ESC tasked with developing the Requests for Proposals and scoring the proposals for Proposition 47 Grant funding. Employees of governmental entities are deemed not to have a financial interest in this program. (See Pen. Code, § 6025.1, subd. (a).)
- C. In cases of an actual conflict of interest with an ESC member, the Board may revoke the grant award and legal consequences could exist for the parties involved, including, but not limited to, repayment of the grant award.

A. B. An invoice is due to the BSCC even if grant funds are not expended or requested during the reporting period. Supporting documentation must be submitted for expenditures upon BSCC's request. All supporting documentation must be maintained by the grantee on site and be readily available for review during BSCC site visits.

2. GRANT AMOUNT AND LIMITATION

- A. In no event shall the BSCC be obligated to pay any amount in excess of the grant award. Grantee waives any and all claims against the BSCC, and the State of California on account of project costs that may exceed the sum of the grant award.
- B. Under no circumstance will a budget item change be authorized that would cause the project to exceed the amount of the grant award identified in this Grant Agreement. In no event shall changes be authorized for the Indirect Costs/Administrative Overhead line item that would result in that item exceeding ten percent (10%) of the grant award.

3. BUDGET CONTINGENCY CLAUSE

- A. This grant agreement is valid and enforceable only if sufficient funds are made available through the annual transfer of savings generated by Proposition 47 from the General Fund to the Safe Neighborhoods and Schools Fund and subsequent transfer from the Safe Neighborhoods and Schools Fund to the Second Chance Fund. (Gov. Code, § 7599.1 & Pen. Code, § 6046.2.) On or before July 31st of each fiscal year the Department of Finance will calculate the state savings associated with Proposition 47 and certify the calculation to the State Controller who shall transfer those funds to the Safe Neighborhoods and Schools Fund. (Gov. Code, § 7599.1.) The grantee agrees that the BSCC's obligation to pay any sum to the grantee under any provision of this agreement is contingent upon the availability of sufficient funding transferred to the Safe Neighborhoods and Schools Fund and subsequent transfer to the Second Chance Fund.
- B. If Proposition 47 funding for any fiscal year is reduced or falls below estimates contained within the Proposition 47 Request for Proposals, the BSCC shall have the option to either cancel this Grant Agreement with no liability occurring to the BSCC or offer an amendment to this agreement to the Grantee to reflect a reduced amount.
- C. If BSCC cancels the agreement pursuant to Paragraph 3(B) or Grantee does not agree to an amendment in accordance with the option provided by Paragraph 3(B), it is mutually agreed that the Grant Agreement shall have no further force and effect. In this event, the BSCC shall have no liability to pay any funds whatsoever to Grantee or to furnish any other considerations under this Agreement

and Grantee shall not be obligated to perform any provisions of this Grant Agreement except that Grantee shall be required to maintain all project records required by Paragraph 6 of Exhibit A for a period of three (3) years following the termination of this agreement.

4. PROJECT COSTS

A. Grantee is responsible for ensuring that actual expenditures are for eligible project costs. "Eligible" and "ineligible" project costs are set forth in the most current version of the July 2016 BSCC Grant Administration Guide, which can be found under Quick Links here:

The provisions of the BSCC Grant Administration Guide are incorporated by reference into this agreement and Grantee shall be responsible for adhering to the requirements set forth therein. To the extent any of the provisions of the BSCC Grant Administration Guide and this agreement conflict, the language in this agreement shall prevail.

- B. Grantee is responsible for ensuring that invoices submitted to the BSCC claim actual expenditures for eligible project costs.
- C. Grantee shall, upon demand, remit to the BSCC any grant funds not expended for eligible project costs or an amount equal to any grant funds expended by the Grantee in violation of the terms, provisions, conditions or commitments of this Grant Agreement.
- D. Grant funds must be used to support new program activities or to augment existing funds that expand current program activities. Grant funds shall not replace (supplant) any federal, state and/or local funds that have been appropriated for the same purpose. Violations can result in recoupment of monies provided under this grantor suspension of future program funding through BSCC grants..

5. PROMPT PAYMENT CLAUSE

Payment will be made in accordance with, and within the time specified in, Government Code Chapter 4.5, commencing with Section 927.

6. WITHHOLDING OF GRANT DISBURSEMENTS

- A. The BSCC may withhold all or any portion of the grant funds provided by this Grant Agreement in the event the Grantee has materially and substantially breached the terms and conditions of this Grant Agreement.
- B. At such time as the balance of state funds allocated to the Grantee reaches five percent (5%), the BSCC may withhold that amount as security, to be released to the Grantee upon compliance with all grant provision, including:
 - 1) submittal and approval of the final invoice;
 - 2) submittal and approval of the final progress report; and
 - 3) submittal and approval of any additional required reports.
- C. The BSCC will not reimburse Grantee for costs identified as ineligible for grant funding. If grant funds have been provided for costs subsequently deemed ineligible, the BSCC may either withhold an equal amount from future payments to the Grantee or require repayment of an equal amount to the State by the Grantee.
- D. In the event that grant funds are withheld from the Grantee, the BSCC's Executive Director or designee shall notify the Grantee of the reasons for withholding and advise the Grantee of the time within which the Grantee may remedy the failure or violation leading to the withholding.

EXHIBIT C GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS (04/2017)

- 1. APPROVAL: This Agreement is of no force or effect until signed by both parties and approved by the Department of General Services, if required. Contractor may not commence performance until such approval has been obtained.
- 2. **AMENDMENT**: No amendment or variation of the terms of this Agreement shall be valid unless made in writing, signed by the parties and approved as required. No oral understanding or Agreement not incorporated in the Agreement is binding on any of the parties.
- **3. ASSIGNMENT**: This Agreement is not assignable by the Contractor, either in whole or in part, without the consent of the State in the form of a formal written amendment.
- 4. AUDIT: Contractor agrees that the awarding department, the Department of General Services, the Bureau of State Audits, or their designated representative shall have the right to review and to copy any records and supporting documentation pertaining to the performance of this Agreement. Contractor agrees to maintain such records for possible audit for a minimum of three (3) years after final payment, unless a longer period of records retention is stipulated. Contractor agrees to allow the auditor(s) access to such records during normal business hours and to allow interviews of any employees who might reasonably have information related to such records. Further, Contractor agrees to include a similar right of the State to audit records and interview staff in any subcontract related to performance of this Agreement. (Gov. Code §8546.7, Pub. Contract Code §10115 et seq., CCR Title 2, Section 1896).
- 5. INDEMNIFICATION: Contractor agrees to indemnify, defend and save harmless the State, its officers, agents and employees from any and all claims and losses accruing or resulting to any and all contractors, subcontractors, suppliers, laborers, and any other person, firm or corporation furnishing or supplying work services, materials, or supplies in connection with the performance of this Agreement, and from any and all claims and losses accruing or resulting to any person, firm or corporation who may be injured or damaged by Contractor in the performance of this Agreement.
- **6. DISPUTES**: Contractor shall continue with the responsibilities under this Agreement during any dispute.
- 7. TERMINATION FOR CAUSE: The State may terminate this Agreement and be relieved of any payments should the Contractor fail to perform the requirements of this Agreement at the time and in the manner herein provided. In the event of such termination the State may proceed with the work in any manner deemed proper by the State. All costs to the State shall be deducted from any sum due the Contractor under this Agreement and the balance, if any, shall be paid to the Contractor upon demand.
- **8. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR**: Contractor, and the agents and employees of Contractor, in the performance of this Agreement, shall act in an independent capacity and not as officers or employees or agents of the State.
- 9. RECYCLING CERTIFICATION: The Contractor shall certify in writing under penalty of perjury, the minimum, if not exact, percentage of post consumer material as defined in the Public Contract Code Section 12200, in products, materials, goods, or supplies offered or sold to the State regardless of whether the product meets the requirements of Public Contract Code Section 12209. With respect to printer or duplication cartridges that comply with the requirements of Section 12156(e), the certification required by this subdivision shall specify that the cartridges so comply (Pub. Contract Code §12205).
- 10. NON-DISCRIMINATION CLAUSE: During the performance of this Agreement, Contractor and its subcontractors shall not deny the contract's benefits to any person on the basis of race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender identity, gender expression, age, sexual orientation, or military and veteran status, nor shall they discriminate unlawfully against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender identity, gender expression, age, sexual orientation, or military and veteran status. Contractor shall insure that the evaluation and treatment of employees and applicants for employment are free of such discrimination. Contractor and subcontractors shall comply with the provisions of the Fair Employment and Housing Act (Gov. Code §12900 et seq.), the regulations promulgated thereunder (Cal. Code Regs., tit. 2, §11000 et seq.), the provisions of Article 9.5, Chapter 1, Part 1, Division 3, Title 2 of

the Government Code (Gov. Code §§11135-11139.5), and the regulations or standards adopted by the awarding state agency to implement such article. Contractor shall permit access by representatives of the Department of Fair Employment and Housing and the awarding state agency upon reasonable notice at any time during the normal business hours, but in no case less than 24 hours' notice, to such of its books, records, accounts, and all other sources of information and its facilities as said Department or Agency shall require to ascertain compliance with this clause. Contractor and its subcontractors shall give written notice of their obligations under this clause to labor organizations with which they have a collective bargaining or other agreement. (See Cal. Code Regs., tit. 2, §11105.)

Contractor shall include the nondiscrimination and compliance provisions of this clause in all subcontracts to perform work under the Agreement.

- 11. CERTIFICATION CLAUSES: The CONTRACTOR CERTIFICATION CLAUSES contained in the document CCC 04/2017 (http://www.dgs.ca.gov/ols/Resources/StandardContractLanguage.aspx) are hereby incorporated by reference and made a part of this Agreement by this reference as if attached hereto.
- **12. TIMELINESS**: Time is of the essence in this Agreement.
- **13. COMPENSATION**: The consideration to be paid Contractor, as provided herein, shall be in compensation for all of Contractor's expenses incurred in the performance hereof, including travel, per diem, and taxes, unless otherwise expressly so provided.
- **14. GOVERNING LAW**: This contract is governed by and shall be interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of California.
- **15. ANTITRUST CLAIMS**: The Contractor by signing this agreement hereby certifies that if these services or goods are obtained by means of a competitive bid, the Contractor shall comply with the requirements of the Government Codes Sections set out below.
 - A. The Government Code Chapter on Antitrust claims contains the following definitions:
 - 1) "Public purchase" means a purchase by means of competitive bids of goods, services, or materials by the State or any of its political subdivisions or public agencies on whose behalf the Attorney General may bring an action pursuant to subdivision (c) of Section 16750 of the Business and Professions Code.
 - 2) "Public purchasing body" means the State or the subdivision or agency making a public purchase. Government Code Section 4550.
 - B. In submitting a bid to a public purchasing body, the bidder offers and agrees that if the bid is accepted, it will assign to the purchasing body all rights, title, and interest in and to all causes of action it may have under Section 4 of the Clayton Act (15 U.S.C. Sec. 15) or under the Cartwright Act (Chapter 2 (commencing with Section 16700) of Part 2 of Division 7 of the Business and Professions Code), arising from purchases of goods, materials, or services by the bidder for sale to the purchasing body pursuant to the bid. Such assignment shall be made and become effective at the time the purchasing body tenders final payment to the bidder. Government Code Section 4552.
 - C. If an awarding body or public purchasing body receives, either through judgment or settlement, a monetary recovery for a cause of action assigned under this chapter, the assignor shall be entitled to receive reimbursement for actual legal costs incurred and may, upon demand, recover from the public body any portion of the recovery, including treble damages, attributable to overcharges that were paid by the assignor but were not paid by the public body as part of the bid price, less the expenses incurred in obtaining that portion of the recovery. Government Code Section 4553.
 - D. Upon demand in writing by the assignor, the assignee shall, within one year from such demand, reassign the cause of action assigned under this part if the assignor has been or may have been injured by the violation of law for which the cause of action arose and (a) the assignee has not been injured thereby, or (b) the assignee declines to file a court action for the cause of action. See Government Code Section 4554.

EXHIBIT C GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS (04/2017)

- **16. CHILD SUPPORT COMPLIANCE ACT**: For any Agreement in excess of \$100,000, the contractor acknowledges in accordance with Public Contract Code 7110, that:
 - A. The contractor recognizes the importance of child and family support obligations and shall fully comply with all applicable state and federal laws relating to child and family support enforcement, including, but not limited to, disclosure of information and compliance with earnings assignment orders, as provided in Chapter 8 (commencing with section 5200) of Part 5 of Division 9 of the Family Code; and
 - B. The contractor, to the best of its knowledge is fully complying with the earnings assignment orders of all employees and is providing the names of all new employees to the New Hire Registry maintained by the California Employment Development Department.
- **17. UNENFORCEABLE PROVISION**: In the event that any provision of this Agreement is unenforceable or held to be unenforceable, then the parties agree that all other provisions of this Agreement have force and effect and shall not be affected thereby.
- **18. PRIORITY HIRING CONSIDERATIONS**: If this Contract includes services in excess of \$200,000, the Contractor shall give priority consideration in filling vacancies in positions funded by the Contract to qualified recipients of aid under Welfare and Institutions Code Section 11200 in accordance with Pub. Contract Code §10353.
- 19. SMALL BUSINESS PARTICIPATION AND DVBE PARTICIPATION REPORTING REQUIREMENTS:
 - A. If for this Contract Contractor made a commitment to achieve small business participation, then Contractor must within 60 days of receiving final payment under this Contract (or within such other time period as may be specified elsewhere in this Contract) report to the awarding department the actual percentage of small business participation that was achieved. (Govt. Code § 14841.)
 - B. If for this Contract Contractor made a commitment to achieve disabled veteran business enterprise (DVBE) participation, then Contractor must within 60 days of receiving final payment under this Contract (or within such other time period as may be specified elsewhere in this Contract) certify in a report to the awarding department: (1) the total amount the prime Contractor received under the Contract; (2) the name and address of the DVBE(s) that participated in the performance of the Contract; (3) the amount each DVBE received from the prime Contractor; (4) that all payments under the Contract have been made to the DVBE; and (5) the actual percentage of DVBE participation that was achieved. A person or entity that knowingly provides false information shall be subject to a civil penalty for each violation. (Mil. & Vets. Code § 999.5(d); Govt. Code § 14841.)
- **20. LOSS LEADER**: If this contract involves the furnishing of equipment, materials, or supplies then the following statement is incorporated: It is unlawful for any person engaged in business within this state to sell or use any article or product as a "loss leader" as defined in Section 17030 of the Business and Professions Code. (PCC 10344(e).)

1. GRANTEE'S GENERAL RESPONSIBILITY

- A. Grantee agrees to comply with all terms and conditions of this Grant Agreement. Review and approval by the BSCC is solely for the purpose of proper administration of grant funds, and shall not be deemed to relieve or restrict the Grantee's responsibility.
- B. Grantee is responsible for the performance of all project activities identified in Attachment 1: Proposition 47 Request for Proposal and Attachment 2: Grant Proposal/Application for Funding.
- C. Grantee shall immediately advise the BSCC of any significant problems or changes that arise during the course of the project.

2. GRANTEE ASSURANCES AND COMMITMENTS

A. Compliance with Laws and Regulations

This Grant Agreement is governed by and shall be interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of California. Grantee shall at all times comply with all applicable State laws, rules and regulations, and all applicable local ordinances.

B. Fulfillment of Assurances and Declarations

Grantee shall fulfill all assurances, declarations, representations, and statements made by the Grantee in Attachment 1: Proposition 47 Request for Proposal and Attachment 2: Grant Proposal/Application for Funding, documents, amendments, approved modifications, and communications filed in support of its request for grant funds.

C. Permits and Licenses

Grantee agrees to procure all permits and licenses necessary to complete the project, pay all charges and fees, and give all notices necessary or incidental to the due and lawful proceeding of the project work.

4. POTENTIAL SUBCONTRACTORS

- A. In accordance with the provisions of this Grant Agreement, the Grantee may subcontract with consultants for services needed to implement and/or support program activities. Grantee agrees that in the event of any inconsistency between this Grant Agreement and Grantee's agreement with a subcontractor, the language of this Grant Agreement will prevail.
- B. Nothing contained in this Grant Agreement or otherwise, shall create any contractual relation between the BSCC and any subcontractors, and no subcontract shall relieve the Grantee of his responsibilities and obligations hereunder. The Grantee agrees to be as fully responsible to the BSCC for the acts and omissions of its subcontractors and of persons either directly or indirectly employed by any of them as it is for the acts and omissions of persons directly employed by the Grantee. The Grantee's obligation to pay its subcontractors is an independent obligation from the BSCC's obligation to make payments to the Grantee. As a result, the BSCC shall have no obligation to pay or to enforce the payment of any moneys to any subcontractor.
- C. Grantee shall ensure that all subcontractors comply with all requirements of this Grant Agreement, including the eligibility requirements stated in the Proposition 47 RFP and described in Appendix B.
- D. Grantee assures that for any subcontract awarded by the Grantee, such insurance and fidelity bonds, as is customary and appropriate, will be obtained.
- E. Grantee agrees to place appropriate language in all subcontracts for work on the project requiring the Grantee's subcontractors to:
 - 1) Books and Records

Maintain adequate fiscal and project books, records, documents, and other evidence pertinent to the subcontractor's work on the project in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Adequate supporting documentation shall be maintained in such detail so as to permit tracing transactions from the invoices, to the accounting records, to the supporting documentation. These records shall be maintained for a minimum of three (3) years after the acceptance of the final grant project audit under the Grant Agreement, and shall be subject to examination and/or audit by the BSCC or designees, state government auditors or designees, or by federal government auditors or designees.

2) Access to Books and Records

Make such books, records, supporting documentations, and other evidence available to the BSCC or designee, the State Controller's Office, the Department of General Services, the Department of Finance, California State Auditor, and their designated representatives during the course of the project and for a minimum of three (3) years after acceptance of the final grant project audit. The Subcontractor shall provide suitable facilities for access, monitoring, inspection, and copying of books and records related to the grant-funded project.

5. PROJECT ACCESS

Grantee shall ensure that the BSCC, or any authorized representative, will have suitable access to project activities, sites, staff and documents at all reasonable times during the grant period including those maintained by subcontractors. Access to program records will be made available by both the grantee and the subcontractors for a period of three (3) years following the end of the project period.

6. ACCOUNTING AND AUDIT REQUIREMENTS

- A. Grantee agrees that accounting procedures for grant funds received pursuant to this Grant Agreement shall be in accordance with generally accepted government accounting principles and practices, and adequate supporting documentation shall be maintained in such detail as to provide an audit trail. Supporting documentation shall permit the tracing of transactions from such documents to relevant accounting records, financial reports and invoices.
- B. The BSCC reserves the right to call for a program or financial audit at any time between the execution of this Grant Agreement and 3 years following the end of the grant period. At any time, the BSCC may disallow all or part of the cost of the activity or action determined to not be in compliance with the terms and conditions of this Grant Agreement, or take other remedies legally available.
- C. Pursuant to Government Code Section 7599.2 (c), grantees are subject to audits by the State Controller's Office and must comply with requirements and instructions provided by that office.

7. MODIFICATIONS

No change or modification in the project will be permitted without prior written approval from the BSCC. Changes may include modification to project scope, changes to performance measures, compliance with collection of data elements, and other significant changes in the budget or program components contained in the Application for Funding. Changes shall not be implemented by the project until authorized by the BSCC.

8. TERMINATION

- A. This Grant Agreement may be terminated by the BSCC at any time after grant award and prior to completion of project upon action or inaction by the Grantee that constitutes a material and substantial breech of this Grant Agreement. Such action or inaction includes but is not limited to:
 - 1) substantial alteration of the scope of the grant project without prior written approval of the BSCC;

- 2) refusal or inability to complete the grant project in a manner consistent with Attachment 1: Proposition 47 Request for Proposal/Application for Funding, or approved modifications;
- 3) failure to provide the required local match share of the total project costs; and
- 4) failure to meet prescribed assurances, commitments, recording, accounting, auditing, and reporting requirements of the Grant Agreement.
- B. Prior to terminating the Grant Agreement under this provision, the BSCC shall provide the Grantee at least 30 calendar days written notice stating the reasons for termination and effective date thereof. The Grantee may appeal the termination decision in accordance with the instructions listed in Exhibit D: Special Terms and Conditions, Number 8. Settlement of Disputes.

8. SETTLEMENT OF DISPUTES

- A. The parties shall deal in good faith and attempt to resolve potential disputes informally. If the dispute persists, the Grantee shall submit to the BSCC Corrections Planning and Grant Programs Division Deputy Director a written demand for a final decision regarding the disposition of any dispute between the parties arising under, related to, or involving this Grant Agreement. Grantee's written demand shall be fully supported by factual information. The BSCC Corrections Planning and Grant Programs Division Deputy Director shall have 30 days after receipt of Grantee's written demand invoking this Section "Disputes" to render a written decision. If a written decision is not rendered within 30 days after receipt of the Grantee's demand, it shall be deemed a decision adverse to the Grantee's contention. If the Grantee is not satisfied with the decision of the BSCC Corrections Planning and Grant Programs Division Deputy Director, the Grantee may appeal the decision, in writing, within 15 days of its issuance (or the expiration of the 30 day period in the event no decision is rendered), to the BSCC Executive Director, who shall have 45 days to render a final decision. If the Grantee does not appeal the decision of the BSCC Corrections Planning and Grant Programs Division Deputy Director, the decision shall be conclusive and binding regarding the dispute and the Contractor shall be barred from commencing an action in court, or with the Victims Compensation Government Claims Board, for failure to exhaust Grantee's administrative remedies.
- B. Pending the final resolution of any dispute arising under, related to or involving this Grant Agreement, Grantee agrees to diligently proceed with the performance of this Grant Agreement, including the providing of services in accordance with the Grant Agreement. Grantee's failure to diligently proceed in accordance with the State's instructions regarding this Grant Agreement shall be considered a material breach of this Grant Agreement.
- C. Any final decision of the State shall be expressly identified as such, shall be in writing, and shall be signed by the Executive Director, if an appeal was made. If the Executive Director fails to render a final decision within 45 days after receipt of the Grantee's appeal for a final decision, it shall be deemed a final decision adverse to the Grantee's contentions. The State's final decision shall be conclusive and binding regarding the dispute unless the Grantee commences an action in a court of competent jurisdiction to contest such decision within 90 days following the date of the final decision or one (1) year following the accrual of the cause of action, whichever is later.
- D. The dates of decision and appeal in this section may be modified by mutual consent, as applicable, excepting the time to commence an action in a court of competent jurisdiction.

9. UNION ACTIVITIES

For all agreements, except fixed price contracts of \$50,000 or less, the Grantee acknowledges that applicability of Government Code §§16654 through 16649 to this Grant Agreement and agrees to the following:

A. No State funds received under the Grant Agreement will be used to assist, promote or deter union organizing.

- B. Grantee will not, for any business conducted under the Grant Agreement, use any State property to hold meetings with employees or supervisors, if the purpose of such meetings is to assist, promote or deter union organizing, unless the State property is equally available to the general public for holding meetings.
- C. If Grantee incurs costs or makes expenditures to assist, promote or deter union organizing, Grantee will maintain records sufficient to show that no reimbursement from State funds has been sought for these costs, and that Grantee shall provide those records to the Attorney General upon request.

10. WAIVER

The parties hereto may waive any of their rights under this Grant Agreement unless such waiver is contrary to law, provided that any such waiver shall be in writing and signed by the party making such waiver.

Project Need

- 1.4 Alameda County Health Care Services Agency (HCSA) is pleased to submit this proposal for funding through the Proposition 47 Grant Program to provide targeted mental health and substance use disorder services and housing-related assistance to the adult reentry population. This project addresses gaps in service and focuses on those with the most pressing needs.
- The Lead Agency (HCSA) and the Local Advisory Committee (LAC) 1.1 identified two overlapping groups on Probation or released from Santa Rita Jail comprising the target population for this project: Adults with Moderate-to-Severe Mental Illness (SMI), and adults with Substance Abuse Disorders (SUD), particularly those who are dually-diagnosed with both SMI and SUD. SMI is defined as having a mental health diagnosis (i.e. schizophrenia, bipolar, major depression, severe anxiety), and a history of 1-2 psychiatric hospitalizations or psychiatric emergency room use. SMI also includes those with Serious and Persistent Mental Illness (SPMI), who are identified by: 1) three or more episodes of psychiatric hospitalization within the last 12 months; 2) former recipient of case management services for those with SPMI; or 3) on Disability Medi-Cal, SSI or identified by Social Services as disabled. SUD is defined as self-reporting SUD or being identified as having SUD by a service provider per American Society for Addiction Medicine (ASAM) criteria. The gap between need and available services for adults with SMI in Alameda County is greater than for juveniles, who access services through Medi-Cal Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnostic and Treatment (EPSDT),

and adults with mild-to-moderate mental illness, who have seen a significant increase in services through AB109 and Oakland Measure Z funding.

1.2 Alameda County, consisting of 821 square miles on the east side of San Francisco Bay, is home to 1.5 million people. There were 42,979 arrests in the County in 2015, 31,452 of which were for misdemeanor offenses (California Department of Justice, 2015). Current prevalence rates of adults with severe mental illness for the greater Bay Area have been estimated to be 9% of the population, with higher rates for individuals impacted by the criminal justice system (California Health Care Foundation). Taken together these figures indicate at least 4,000 individuals with severe mental illness were arrested in Alameda County in 2015.

In the last 10 years, Alameda County has been a pioneer in envisioning and employing innovative evidence-based practices towards collectively reforming the juvenile and adult reentry system. The Alameda County Probation Department (Probation) convened the Joint Reentry One Table of over 100 diverse stakeholders to write the "Road to Reentry" -- Alameda County's Reentry Strategic Plan -- approved by the county Board of Supervisors in March 2014. The plan identified the need to improve continuity of care post-release. Unmet needs for the reentry population identified during this process included continuity of professional mental health clinical support, supportive environment for SUD recovery, lack of housing options, and continuity in medication.

As part of an effort to identify gaps between services and needs, the County's Community Corrections Partnership Programs and Services Workgroup reviewed data on the mental health reentry population from the County's Behavioral Health Care Services Department in September 2016. The report indicated that of 8,975

unduplicated clients with AB 109 offenses or receiving mental health services through the Adult Forensic Behavioral Health (AFBH) program at Santa Rita Jail 5,175 have SMI or SPMI. However, fewer than 10% of this group had received case management services since 2014 (481 individuals), resulting in a significant gap in mental health (MH) services (Probation Department).

There is also a considerable need for SUD services, particularly for those with cooccurring disorders. Nationally, over 50% of women and 44% of men in jail have a drug
or alcohol dependency (Assembly Bill No. 1056). In Alameda County, 72% of the SPMI
reentry population (1927 individuals) and 55% of the SMI reentry population (1381
individuals) has been identified as having a co-occurring SUD, while only 18% (1604) of
the reentry population received at least one SUD service through BHCS since 2014
(Probation Department). This indicates a gap in SUD services for the target population.
Unduplicated utilization of SUD services by AB 109 clients increased 56% from 280 in
2014/15 to 439 in 2015/16. The LAC and community advocates, and service providers
reported barriers to service for individuals with co-occurring disorders.

The San Francisco Bay Area has one of the least affordable housing markets in the country, and housing is a major unmet need for the reentry population. Over the past several years, many shelters, halfway houses, and single room occupancy buildings in the county have closed. In 2012 Alameda County Housing and Community

Development (HCD) and Probation launched a Realignment Housing Program.

Probation officers refer clients to two agency partners for comprehensive housing supports. The program served 97 clients in the first year and has grown rapidly. In the

12 months ending June 2016 there were 451 clients referred, with 126 of those still waiting to be enrolled, as demand for these services far outpaces capacity.

1.3 Alameda is the most racially and ethnically diverse of the nine Bay Area counties: 33% White, 27% Asian, 23% Latino, 12% African American, 4% Multi-race, 1% Pacific Islander, 1% Native American; 43% of the population speak a language other than English at home (State of California Department of Finance). Youth aged 0 to 19 years make up 26.6% of the population; 62.5% are adults aged 20 to 64, and the remaining 10.9% are aged 65 and over. The Probation population is disproportionately male (84%), with overrepresentation of African Americans (50%) and Latinos (23%) and underrepresentation of whites (20%) and Asians (4%) (Probation Department, 2013).

Community Engagement

- 2.1, 2.2 See attached Local Advisory Committee (LAC) Membership Roster and Letters of Agreement.
- 2.3 The LAC, co-convened by HCSA and Probation, includes local stakeholders with experience and expertise in the prospective MH and SUD treatment services for people in the criminal justice system funded under the Prop 47 grant program. The LAC is comprised of representatives from the Alameda County Community Corrections Partnership (CCP) from the following county agencies: Health Care Services Agency (HCSA), District Attorney (DA), Probation, Public Defender (PD), Sheriff, Housing and Community Development (HCD), plus four additional Community Representatives (CRs) who were selected through an open application process outlined below. All four CRs are formerly incarcerated and provide direct services to the target population with government or community agencies. Three of them have or are

pursuing master's degrees in related fields (social work, public policy), three are African American and one is Asian/Pacific Islander. Three are male and one is female.

- An ad hoc Prop 47 planning group began meeting in summer 2016. convened by Probation to support communication between community members and government agencies on Prop 47 implementation. This group included members of the CCP and the Alameda County Justice Reinvestment Coalition (JRC), 15 organizations working to direct county resources away from prison and jails and towards communitybased programs and services. HCSA drafted a nomination application for CRs, which was reviewed and approved by the planning group at its regular meeting on 12/15/16. The group decided to require that CRs be formerly incarcerated or systems-impacted and be demographically representative of the target population, in addition to covering the county's geography and having expertise on reentry services. A nomination committee was formed, consisting of CCP representatives and two JRC members. Outreach for CR nominations was conducted through emails to the Probation list reaching over 700 reentry providers and community stakeholders and through individual contacts by CCP leaders; the nomination application was also posted on Probation's website. The nominating committee selected the CRs at a meeting held on 1/13/17.
- 2.6 Two LAC meetings were held. In accordance with the Brown Act, notice of both LAC meetings was posted on the Probation Department website in advance, including an agenda and a scheduled public comment section. Notice was also sent over Probation's email list to 700+ reentry stakeholders and community members.

The first ACProp47 LAC meeting was held on 1/17/17 from 5 to 7pm, with a second meeting held at 5:30pm on 1/25/17. In addition to the LAC members, participants

included county residents and representatives of reentry and employment service providers. HCSA presented information about the Prop 47 RFP and data on the target population. Attendees engaged in in-depth conversations about needs and potential programs. The LAC agreed to focus on the needs of those with moderate-to-severe MH issues and co-occurring disorders and identified housing as a significant supporting need for this population.

Project Description

3.1-3.5 The purpose of the Alameda County Proposition 47 Project (ACProp47) is to support residents who are involved in the justice system who have a MH issue and/or SUD that limits one or more of their life activities. To this end, ACProp47 project funds will be used to augment and expand services under the County's coordinated reentry plan, with guidance from the Local Advisory Committee. Specifically, funds will be used to: 1) implement a new, county-wide, intensive, multidisciplinary reentry team (MRT) model to provide service for members in the target population who are experiencing moderate, severe, or serious and persistent mental illness; 2) augment contracts with existing community based SUD providers to increase numbers of the target population who receive their services – in particular those with co-occurring disorders; and 3) launch a new grant program designed to increase the number and ability of organizations in the County to provide comprehensive housing supports.

HCSA will hire the ACProp47 Coordinator, who will manage all three Prop 47 programs. In addition to overseeing the augmented contracts with current MH and SUD providers, the Coordinator will implement the Community Housing Grant process to

select and manage CBOs distributing the housing support funds. The Coordinator will also work closely with HCSA's other criminal justice programs, including AFBH and AB109-funded programs to ensure efficient and effective service delivery and the development of effective reentry MH and SUD continuums of care.

Probation will hire a Community Behavioral Health Program Manager to manage all Prop 47 and related behavioral health project coordination with HCSA. The Manager will coordinate all Probation efforts related to assessments, referrals, training, and communication with Deputy Probation Officers and Probation-contracted service providers; this includes incorporating evidence-based practices such as Trauma-Informed Care and Restorative Justice into Probation efforts, in addition to supporting HCSA staff in incorporating criminology concepts and forensic-based evidence. The Manager will also coordinate data collection and evaluation efforts, as well as support RFP development and contract monitoring for Prop 47 and related programs.

Multidisciplinary Reentry Teams: Funds will be used to create two MRTs to provide comprehensive case management and treatment to justice-involved individuals with serious and persistent mental illness (SPMI) or moderate-to-severe mental illness (SMI). Each MRT will provide 80 clients with services and resources to reduce MH impairment. The model has a client/staff ratio of 13:1, with each team consisting of: 1 FTE clinical supervisor, 3 FTE social worker clinicians, 3 FTE peer counselors, and .33 FTE psychiatrist. MRTs will provide psychiatric treatment, intensive care coordination/case management, housing support, connection to community resources, employment support, and linkage to MH, substance abuse, legal, life skills services.

Length of treatment will be 12-24 months with a step-down to mild-moderate MH services through existing Case and Care Management Teams.

This model effectively integrates peer services, meaningfully employing and empowering formerly incarcerated persons as peer counselors, who compose nearly 50% of team members. Peer counselors have a unique ability to relate to and motivate other formerly incarcerated persons through the shared reentry experience, providing intensive case management, accompanying clients to appointments and ensuring they receive necessary services. Because all team members bill Medi-Cal directly, this model effectively leverages 63% of its funding.

The program model, which is informed by evidence-based Assertive Community

Treatment (ACT) practices, was developed by HCSA behavioral staff based on a care
management team model for the reentry population funded through AB109. The HCSA
team reviewed existing contracts and selected two providers based on the criteria of 1)
successfully attaining outcomes for current contracts for similar services and 2)
demonstrate cultural competency in serving the target population: 1) Bay Area

Community Services (BACS) is the largest provider of recovery-oriented behavioral
health and housing solutions in the Bay Area and is the current provider of the AB 109funded care management team model described above; based in Oakland with
locations throughout the County, they have a holistic approach and specialize in the
most underserved populations including employment of systems-impacted individuals.

2) Based in South County, La Familia Counseling Services is an inclusive, Latino,
community-based, multicultural organization with bilingual/bicultural direct service staff

including systems-impacted individuals; La Familia operates the Full-Service Partnership Model. which closely mirrors the MRT model.

SUD Component: ACProp47 will augment existing contracts to support a clientcentered and clinically-driven system of care for clients with SUD encompassing major geographic regions of the county, with a focus on co-occurring disorders. Currently, Probation and AFBH refer clients to Center Point for SUD screening using ASAM criteria, placement in the appropriate level of care, and ongoing care management. including stepping down to lower levels of care when the client is ready. An additional .5 FTE staff member will increase the capacity of Center Point to conduct these functions, and contract augmentation will enable designated CBOs to accept increased referrals. At least 83 unduplicated clients will receive services annually as follows: Residential treatment (CURA, Cronin House) – 15; Outpatient only or in combination with Recovery Residence (Options in North County, Second Chance in South County) – 43; Recovery Residence conditional on outpatient participation (CURA in North County, Second Chance in South County) – 25. Treatment programs were selected based on long-term proven abilities to serve clients involved with the criminal justice; ability to provide low barrier services; capacity to address co-occurring MH and/or physical health disorders that complicate the SUDs (e.g. Cronin House specializes in dually diagnosed SPMI clients); use of approaches and techniques of Trauma-Informed Care and Restorative Justice; and geographic distribution throughout the county.

Community Housing Grant Program: The ACProp47 Coordinator will set up a competitive community grant process enabling community-based organizations (CBOs) to distribute funds to eligible individuals in the target population who are formerly

incarcerated and have SMI, SPMI, and/or SUD. A total of \$500,000 will be granted through this competitive process; each CBO can apply for up to \$75,000 per year, with up to 10% to be used for administrative costs and the rest to be distributed. Detailed record-keeping will be required to ensure recipient eligibility. Each recipient can receive up to \$2,000 for eligible expenditures, including but not limited to Rental Assistance, Security Deposit, Utilities, Furniture, Minor Home Repairs, Credit Repair, Assistance with Poor Rental History, and Moving Expenses. We expect 6 to 7 CBOs to participate, and a minimum of 225 individuals will receive funds.

- 3.6 Upon referral from county or community-based providers, potential clients will be assessed for Prop 47 programs eligibility due to MH and/or SUD through the evidence-based risk and needs assessment tools currently used by Behavioral Health Care Staff. This includes evaluations of MH, SUD, co-occurring disorders, and criminogenic factors. Both Probation and AFBH will be able to directly refer to MH and SUD services to ensure a smooth transition upon reentry from jails. Individuals presenting with SUD are referred to Center Point, where assessments are made per ASAM criteria and clients referred to the appropriate level of care. Eligibility for housing grants will be determined via a standardized screening tool developed by the participating CBOs in partnership with the LAC and ACProp47 Coordinator.
- 3.7 This project is part of a larger strategy informed by the CCP-developed Road to Reentry Strategic Plan to create a MH and SUD continuum of care for the reentry population in the county. The ACProp47 Coordinator and LAC will focus their efforts during implementation on improving coordination with implementation of AB109, Oakland Measure Z (including reentry support), diversion, and countywide housing

efforts including shelter, rapid rehousing, and permanent supportive housing (HomeStretch), in order to effect a countywide system of care for all Prop 47-eligible individuals. New components of this system funded through AB109 include clinical positions housed at Probation; housing and employment reentry teams; and case and care management teams serving those with mild-to-moderate MH issues.

- 3.8 Trauma-informed care is embedded in the philosophy of the MRT model.

 Staffs of both BACS and La Familia have been trained in trauma-informed care, and contracts will require the use of a trauma-informed care approach in MRTs.
- 3.9 Because the MRTs and SUD services will be created by augmenting existing contracts with providers operating similar services, start-up time will be minimized. MRTs and augmented SUD services will launch within the first quarter and be at capacity within the first year. The housing grant program will be launched through an expedited competitive process and not through a lengthier RFP process. Grants will be issued by the end of the first quarter.
 - 3.10 See attached letters of agreement for discussion of local agency impact.

Project Evaluation Plan

The Lead Agency has engaged Resource Development Associates (RDA) to create and implement the evaluation plan, collect and evaluate data, assess the project, and share outcomes. RDA is currently contracted to conduct a comprehensive evaluation of the implementation and outcomes of Public Safety Realignment in Alameda County, which will allow the Prop 47 evaluation team to leverage their knowledge of county services and data systems.

- 4.1 The evaluation will measure the extent to which the project has achieved the goals and objectives listed in Attachment I.
- 4.2-4.3 The evaluation will include both process and outcome components, shown in Table 1. The evaluation effort will leverage Alameda County's existing efforts toward uniform data collection and measurement through its Results-Based Accountability (RBA) process.

4.4 RDA will conduct a mixed-methods process and outcome evaluation, working with HCSA and other project partners to 1) confirm evaluation measures: 2) execute data sharing agreements for the evaluation; and 3) collect, clean, and analyze data. Where gaps in data exist, the evaluation team will work with County and contracted community partners to develop data collection tools and provide technical assistance to support data collection. 4.6 While the research methods will be finalized through a project kickoff phase with HCSA and project partners, we anticipate that the design will include pre/post surveys before and after service participation to measure changes over time; analysis of treatment and administrative data from county departments and treatment providers to measure service delivery and participant outcomes; interviews with HCSA, Probation, and CBO leadership to understand the results of implementation; and focus groups with treatment staff and clients to gather feedback about service delivery and perceived client outcomes. 4.5 Analysis of program administrative data, such as frequency of appointments, length of service, dosage, services delivered, and service completion, coupled with qualitative explorations of program implementation, will allow the evaluation team to assess fidelity to the project plan and to make recommendations for continuous improvement throughout the grant period.

4.7 RDA will prepare the required two-year preliminary evaluation report and the final local evaluation report, along with periodic briefs that summarize the key findings from the evaluation for a lay audience. RDA will present the reports to governing bodies, community partners, and other stakeholders via the CCP, the LAC, and other bodies as appropriate. RDA will work with HCSA and Probation to identify opportunities to present the briefs to other stakeholders in an accessible and actionable format.

Guiding Principles

- 5.1 The proposed project builds on the extensive collaborative work of over 100 diverse stakeholders to create the Road to Reentry strategic plan, and the extensive community partnerships that ACHCSA has cultivated to most effectively serve the target population. The project augments existing CBO contracts.
- 5.2 ACProp47 has selected CBO providers with a proven record of providing culturally competent, trauma-informed care. Contracts will include a requirement that staff participate in Trauma-Informed Care training and incorporate the approach into their work. Further, the County's Road to Reentry Strategic Plan established professional development requirements as an industry standard for all service providers who receive funding through the County's investment including, but not limited to, Probation, the District Attorney's office, and local police to establish and enrich education around best practices for Trauma Informed Care, Motivational Interviewing and Restorative Justice Practices.

The housing fund is designed to be flexible and responsive to the individual, holistic needs of each applicant. The reentry teams use an interdisciplinary approach with a peer counselor as a primary component, to address the holistic needs of clients and to

respond flexibly while providing evidence-based treatment of MH issues. SUD screening and care management will ensure tailored services.

ACProp47 advances the principles of Restorative Justice, particularly through interventions that enable those who have committed crimes to gain insight into the causes and effects of their behavior, take responsibility, and address underlying MH and substance abuse issues. The three components of ACProp47 -- Multidisciplinary reentry teams, housing assistance funds, and augmented SUD services -- address barriers to service identified in the Road to Reentry Plan.

- 5.3 The CBO providers were chosen specifically because they provide culturally competent, client-focused, and geographically wide-ranging services. Based in South County, La Familia is an inclusive, Latino, community-based, multicultural organization with bilingual/bicultural direct service staff. BACS is the largest provider of recovery-oriented behavioral health and housing solutions in the Bay Area, and they specialize in underserved populations including formerly incarcerated individuals. BACS currently successfully manages an all-reentry care management program, including 3 formerly incarcerated case managers. Similarly, all SUD providers are current contractors serving AB109 clients, so have deep experience and competence in serving the reentry population. The Community Housing Grant CBOs will be selected based on their cultural competency in serving the target population.
- 5.4 MRTs, SUD care management, and housing grants will improve participants' lives by providing holistic care, relieving symptoms, improving stability, reducing recidivism and improving life chances. 5.5 ACProp47 is committed to the Proposition 47 Guiding Principles, as illustrated throughout this proposal.



ACProp47 impact on ASCO:

ASCO understands that former offenders who have the resources to meet basic needs and are motivated to take steps towards creating a more constructive life will be less likely to commit crimes and go back to jail and prison. Specific to the Prop 47 grant program, in response to this understanding, the ACSO Youth and Family Bureau implements Operation My Home Town (OMHT) Re-Entry Program. Under OMHT, Case Managers connect with people while they are still incarcerated to help plan for their needs and goals upon release. Linkage is provided to programs inside the jail and to outside housing, employment, family supports, legal advocacy, drug and alcohol treatment, health care, recreational activities, educational resources, and social services. Some of OMHT implementation activities include:

- pre-release administration of the Alameda County Adult Risk Assessment Tool, which
 measures the level of risk of recidivism (risk principle) and allows for matching the level
 of supervision to the offender's risk to reoffend (risk principle); assessing service/treatment
 needs (needs principle);
- engaging the inmate in making the choice to seek a better life through Motivational Interviewing (needs principle);



placing the inmate in the Re-entry Based Incarceration housing unit, which provides
intensive cognitive behavioral interventions as a core part of programming; assigning a
case manager who helps the participant develop an Individualized Reentry Plan; and
facilitating uninterrupted delivery of post-release services by the same case manager who
provided pre-release services for a period of up to one year from the release date.

ACSO has long history of active partnership with HCSA in regards to supporting reentry and other justice involved populations in accessing needed service safe and affordable housing. To this end, in collaboration with HCSA, Alameda County Probation and myriad other agencies, ACSO has been active in developing and implementing the Alameda County "Road to Reentry" Strategic Plan with the vision "All people who have had contact with the criminal justice system living in Alameda County will live a healthy, safe, and productive life with positive support systems."
