How do you identify within the Asian American and Pacific Islander community?

While I'm not Asian American or Pacific Islander, I've built strong bonds with the Southeast Asian community over the past 20 years and relate to Cambodians as my second family.

How did you find your way to the Bay Area?

Originally from Iran, I came to the U.S. for higher education. It was in the Bay Area that I decided to study psychology and became deeply involved in the Iranian pro-democracy student movement, which fortunately led me to a life of community activism.

How has your heritage shaped the person you are today?

My Iranian background and close ties with Cambodian refugees whom I consider family, have significantly shaped my identity.

Who are the role models or mentors that have influenced you or helped guide you?

I draw inspiration from Gandhi, Martin Luther King, Nelson Mandela, Nasrin Sotoudeh, and Narges Mohammadi—two Iranian human rights activists currently imprisoned by the Islamic Republic regime.

What brings you joy about your heritage and culture?

The following ethos and values that I have witnessed in my Cambodian and Southeast Asian family bring me joy: living in the moment and appreciating life, humility, authenticity, generosity, inclusiveness, forgiveness, and gratitude.
