Course Objectives

- 1.) Identify three trauma-informed and culturally responsive strategies in addressing trauma, substance abuse, and other complex mental health challenges through case management services.
- 2.) Identify two ways to increase assessment and conceptualization skills in understanding potential challenges in family dynamics in families that experience multilayered and complex needs.
- 3.) Review at least two communication and conflict resolution strategies to support relationship concerns and dynamics in families when providing case management services.
- 4.) Identify 2-3 ways to engage families and build a positive alliance in family therapy, including through trauma informed practices, linguistically appropriate, and culturally responsive practices.

Case management services can be beneficial for youth and families who experience complex and multilayered needs. As the service can be comprehensive in providing support in various life domains, including health, social, psychological, and vocational needs, this training will offer support for providers to build on their engagement, assessment, and plan development skills. This training is about supporting families through a compassionate, trauma-informed, and culturally responsive lens. This training will also focus on empowering families by providing access to resources and promoting safety and wellness of youth and families experiencing complex challenges that often are a result of repeated exposure to trauma, or other challenges such as substance abuse and high-risk behaviors.

This training will provide an opportunity to support providers to increase their skills in assessing and responding to family dynamics (i.e. navigating communication patterns, conflict resolution and varying family relationships), through a family systems lens. How to support service coordination so families can thrive, be treated through a trauma-informed lens, reviewing life domains and ensuring that families are connected to adequate resources will also be covered.
