Awakening Healing: An Indigenous Perspective on Trauma Healing Friday, October 17, 2025 10:30 a.m. – 12:30 p.m.

Course Description:

Join celebrated Native American racial equity educator and scholar, Anton Treuer, for a deep dive into community-defined healing practices and strategies for mental health and addiction recovery, with a special focus on practices to help address historical and contemporary trauma. Treuer is Ojibwe, from the Leech Lake Reservation in northern Minnesota. His groundbreaking scholarship and service as a spiritual leader in Native spaces has equipped him with an authentic perspective on the most important work of our time and our individual and collective quest for healing. The session thus addresses directly the National CLAS Standards "Principal Standard 1: 'Provide effective, equitable, understandable, and respectful quality care and services that are responsive to diverse cultural health beliefs and practices, preferred languages, health literacy, and other communication needs.'

Dr. Anton Treuer, Ph.D.

Is Professor of Ojibwe at Bemidji State University and Editor of the Oshkaabewis Native Journal, the only academic journal of the Ojibwe language. He is the author of many books, including *Everything You Wanted to Know About Indians But Were Afraid to Ask* and *The Language Warrior's Manifesto*, and has lectured widely on Ojibwe history, language, culture, and racial equity. Dr. Treuer has received fellowships from the Guggenheim Foundation, the National Endowment for the Humanities, and the National Science Foundation, and in 2018 was named Guardian of Culture and Lifeways by the Association of Tribal Archives, Libraries, and Museums.
