Purpose of the Meeting

The Advisory Council are subject matter experts within the County of Alameda who hold specialized knowledge on substance use disorders and/or county processes and/or fiscal expertise and/or deep understanding of the opioid crisis as a public health emergency. The Council will meet 2 to 3 times a year to provide ongoing feedback to Alameda County Behavioral Health Department (ACBHD) on the planning, spending, and long-term strategies regarding Opioid Settlement dollars. The Council will not be a decision-making body but will provide expert content, advice and guidance to ACBHD to guide the department in the various needs of the settlement dollars.

- Dr. Karyn Tribble (ACBHD Director) welcomed the council members.
- Dr. Kathleen Clanon (Agency Medical Director, ACH) provided an overview of the opioid crisis and stated that **the opioid related poisoning deaths in Alameda County are continuing to rise since 2017.**
- Dr. Aaron Chapman (ACBHD Medical Director) reviewed ACBHD's preparations, goals and activities/initiatives that are underway with the Opioid money.
- ACBHD Finance Director, Cecilia Serrano provided an overview of the opioid settlement funding and funding activities.
 - Total Payments Received: \$8.7M
 - Total Expenditures: \$6,500



Preventing Opioid Overdoses: What Works?

TREAT SUBSTANCE USE DISORDERS



- Public protection partners
- Prescriber education
- Prescriber accountability

- Drug checking
- Test strips
- Syringe Services



Overdose Prevention Program at AC Health

Primary funding sources:

- CDC Grant: Overdose Data to Action Cooperative Agreement
 - Improvements in speed and useability of data
 - Expansion of treatment, especially MAT
 - \$2.549 million per year for 5 years
- Prop. 47 Allocation: Justice Involved Focus
 - Expands linkage to treatment after leaving SRJ
 - Lowering barriers for entry into treatment
 - \$360,000 total over two years
- District 5 Measure A: Drug Checking Contract
 - Drug Checking service and confirmatory testing
 - \$939,524 total over two years



Drug Checking in Alameda County

- Testing of substances purchased on the street by people who use the needle exchanges.
 - Uses a portable lab device that gives a result in 15 mins
 - Results checked later by a reference lab
- Pilot in Alameda County funded by CDC and by Measure A funds from Sup Carson's office
 - 80+ samples tested so far for calibration and quality checks
 - Launch in early June.....



Naloxone background

- Naloxone is a medication that anyone can use to stop opioid overdose
 - Binds human opiate receptors
 - Fast acting with short duration
 - Can precipitate opiate withdrawal
- Naloxone distribution prevents overdose deaths

Naloxone efforts at Alameda County Health

- Link county providers to free naloxone distributed by State
 - 64 providers got 35,000 naloxone units from DHCS*, Jan-June 2023
 - CBOs, health care, law enforcement, schools, higher ed and others
- Provide naloxone education and training
- Collaborate with SSPs and internal partners (Behavioral Health, HIV Prevention, Emergency Medical Services)
- Use data to support naloxone availability in highest need areas, including geographic areas with identified service gaps



Naloxone in High Traffic Public Areas

- Naloxone Stand Boxes
- Naloxone Wall-Mounted Boxes
- Harm Reduction Vending Machines
- Community Event Tables, etc.










Growth in Community Interest in Naloxone





Collaboration Example: Addiction Treatment and Linkages from Santa Rita Jail

- Efforts to expand use of MAT for people in SRJ- led by AC BHD
- Additional focus on linking people to SUD treatment upon discharge from SRJ
 - Outpatient prescriptions for MAT at release
 - Started in July 2023
 - Connection to AHS Bridge Substance Use Navigator for follow-up to setup an appointment
 - 314 referrals from SRJ to Bridge Clinic in 2023
 - Bridge pilot to do initial telehealth appointment prior to release
 - Started March 2024
- Prop. 47 funding will allow for better coordination of this work between WellPath, HEPPAC, Bridge, and other resources

Opioid Settlement Funds: Fiscal Update

Total Settlement
 Funds: Approximately \$46M for 18 years

- Total Local Allocation Funds Received: \$9.6M
 - County Local Allocation: \$9M
 - City Local Allocation: \$.6M (Alameda, Albany, Fremont, Hayward, Livermore, Newark, Piedmont, Pleasanton)
- Total FY 2023-24 Estimated Expenditures: \$4.2M

Mini-grants to Community Organizations	FY 2023-2024	\$3.0M	Program to continue through FY 25-26
Alameda Health Systems - Bridge Clinic	FY 2024-2025	\$0.2M	Per year for duration of funding
SUD Outreach Teams	FY 2024-2025	\$0.7M	Per year for duration of funding
Public Media Campaign	FY 2024-2025	\$0.5M	\$0.5M per year for five (5) years (\$2.5M total)

Capital Projects – La Familia	FY 2024-2025	\$0.5M	1 Year
Capital Projects - St. Regis	FY 2025-2026	\$3.0M	1 Year
