

Tobacco Use in the Military and Impact on Veterans

Description: This 1-hour training course will focus on the historical influences of the tobacco industry on the military over time. Participants will learn about the unfair marketing strategies of the industry on the military population and the especially harmful effects tobacco products have had on Veterans. An overview of trauma specific to Veterans and best treatment practices for tobacco use among the population will also be provided.

Who Should Attend: This training is directed towards administrative and/or clinical staff of Alameda County Public Health Department providers and Alameda County Behavioral Health (ACBH) funded substance use treatment and mental health programs, but all staff are welcome to attend.
